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Minister's Musings

4 Just after daybreak, Jesus stood on the beach, but the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. 5 Jesus said to them, "Children, you have no fish, have you?" They answered him, "No." 6 He said to them, "Cast the net to the right side of the boat, and you will find some." So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in because there were so many fish. 7 That disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on his outer garment, for he had taken it off, and jumped into the sea.

9 When they had gone ashore, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish on it, and bread. 10 Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish that you have just caught." 11 So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore... 12 Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast."... 15 When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my lambs." 16 A second time he said to him, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Tend my sheep." 17 He said to him the third time, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, "Do you love me?" And he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep." -Selected verses from John 21:1-17

Though Peter's story does not end with the conclusion of the gospels, we finish our series with Peter's encounter with the risen Christ. In this final week, we come full circle with Peter. He has dropped his nets, walked on water, professed his faith, been rebuked, received footwashing, denied Jesus, and run to the tomb.

And now, Jesus once again meets him at the shoreline where Peter is casting his nets. Jesus offers abundant nourishment and also a new command: "Feed my sheep." Then he turns to Peter and asks three times, "Do you love me?" It's as if Jesus says, "Here's my heart," which washes over Peter's three denials like a healing balm. No matter how far we wander, may we entrust our hearts to God. No matter if our faith is strong or weak, what we can give is our love.

After Easter Sunday, let us include this story in order to come full circle with Peter in his journey with Jesus. This week's text could be read alongside our first text for the series (Luke 5:1-11). The parallels and connections between the two are palpable and powerful. Once again, Jesus offers Peter abundance.

His journey—like ours—is not linear, but God's grace continues to circle back to him again and again like a familiar chorus played on repeat. In this text, we primarily want to focus on Peter's threefold redemption granted to him by Jesus' question: "Do you love me?" We might imagine Jesus asking us the same question. As we move forward in our faith journeys, how can we let love lead the way?

Standing Up for The Rights of Children, Save The Children USA

They are the only international, non-governmental organization to respond to the crisis on both sides of our southern border. This organization prioritizes the rights of children, whatever the situation. They believe that every child deserves advocacy and protection from harm.

What would our society be like, if protecting children and meeting their needs was always the most important thing? In Mexico Save The Children is working in 40 shelters in 7 border cities and also partnering with 41 organizations providing humanitarian aid. A staff member of Save The Children writes of her visits to a partner agency.... "Today we met Mr. Jimmy, who migrated from Haiti with his family over 25 years ago. Today he oversees Safe Harbor and dedicates his life to making the journey for immigrants safer. Safe Harbor began with cots in a church community center, but today it spans to multiple properties, owned or rented by the church, where migrant families find shelter, food, healthcare and placement services. "When we cannot be there ourselves to offer help, it is reassuring to know that there are others who can. It is our job, as their partners, to make sure they have the resources they need to continue their work. When we reach out to a child in need, wherever they are, whatever the situation, we are Christ to them.

There was a presentation by "Sunrise Movement" lead by Matt Finch and 5 others. The goal is to establish a garden on church grounds to grow produce for food pantry clients. The area will likely be on the north side of the parsonage, 6 raised beds will be constructed (12' x 5') and a 32' x 24' fence erected. Pantry clients will be surveyed for preferences on crops grown. The Sunrise Movement helps with financing and a core group will be doing the bulk of the work with support from O Zone. There is no liability for the church; Matt's group is checking on their liability information and will report back to Property.

Consistory Minutes March 14, 2024

The meeting was called to order at 7:32 by Pastor Alisha who asked for a volunteer to take the meeting minutes. Terry Laibach volunteered. Pastor Alisha opened the meeting with prayer, prose and artwork based on the devotional being read this Lenten season by the congregation, "Wandering Heart".

Motion made, seconded, and carried (M/S/C) to approve the minutes with the following amendment: Page 2 of the meeting minutes under Fellowship: The third line has a sentence on the confirmation class that should be moved under Faith and Education

Pastoral Report: Pastor Alisha reviewed all the meetings, administrative tasks and ministry being undertaken leading up to Easter, including two unexpected funerals in the next two days. Pastor has performed premarital counseling, created bulletin graphics and social media posts, hosted a clergy meeting, met with the families and various church committees on funeral specifics, and wrote the liturgies for the classis meeting and mid-week Lenten services being hosted by St. John's next week. This is all in addition to regular Sunday services.

Motion M/S/C to approve Pastoral Report.

Financial Review: The Monthly Review, Balance Sheet, and Budget vs. Actual FY24 reports were presented by Glenn Countryman. The fiscal outlook for the church looks positive at present.

Committee Reports:

Faith and Education: Desiree Albizu reported that Eileen Wambach has been able to hold Sunday school weekly throughout Lent. Eileen will be relying on the Easter leader resource book from the Walk with Me curriculum as well as the scriptures Pastor Alisha has been referring to during this Lenten season. Commissioned Pastor James Walrath has been meeting with Whitt Meek (9th grader) for confirmation class. There were no youth from other RCA churches interested in the invitation to attend confirmation class. Bible Study continues each Wednesday at 10:15 a.m. The book club will meet Monday, April 22 to discuss Tom Lake by Ann Patchett. All are welcome in either of these two groups anytime.

Fellowship: Elizabeth Young stated that fellowship is looking to move beyond coffee hour after church and would like to explore new ideas for what that might look like. Pastor Alisha recommended that a committee be formed to assist with this effort. There was concern expressed for keeping coffee hour undisrupted (see violin recital discussion below for more on this). Fellowship is being tapped with assisting with two funerals, the Mid-Hudson Classis meeting, and mid-week Lenten services coming up.

Finance: The committee is still working on fixing errors in reporting. They would also like to have the church books audited and are currently looking at the best pricing for this service. There is enough money in the budget to pay for the denominational assessment for the remainder of the year so the committee voted to pay off the balance. There is an endowment fund policy/management review underway. Finance is forming a sub-committee to put a policy of guidelines together. Once the policy is adopted an Investment Committee will be formed to review the management of the endowment/scholarship/cemetery funds. The congregation will be kept informed.

Mission and Outreach: Wendy Walrath began her report with a big thank you to Peta Bartles, Bev Kipp, and their amazing team for cooking and delivering meals to Hudson River Housing last month. The book sale brought in \$437.00 and will go towards another Hudson River Housing meal. The M&O team will be assembling Church World Service hygiene kits on March 17 after worship. The kits will be delivered to a drop off location in CT on April 17th. These kits will benefit those struck by disaster needing basic washing essentials. World Central Kitchen (working in Gaza) is being supported for the March mission and in April the focus will be supporting children on the southern border.

Property: The committee is gearing up for many repair projects on the parsonage, church, fellowship, and education wings. Motion made by Glenn Countryman to give Property the authorization to proceed with the Sunrise Movement garden construction project. Seconded and carried by consistory.

Worship: Worship and Fellowship held a joint zoom meeting on 3/12 to discuss the details of the upcoming services being held at St. John's over the next 3 weeks. Terry Laibach developed a timeline of activities and responsibilities (Countdown to Easter) and distributed it at the meeting. Things are already changing as these meeting minutes are being typed. The flexibility of all is appreciated! On deck are the funerals of Anita Sprague and Gloria Rouse, Mid-Hudson Classis meeting, mid-week Lenten service, Palm Sunday/New Member Recognition, Maundy Thursday Tenebrae service, and Easter sunrise and morning worship services. Whew! Pete Fenaroli has been busy keeping the choir going and trying to highlight Joey Breslau's musical talents. The choir will be performing anthems for Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday.

Technology: File migrations are occurring on an as needed basis; this will be a focus for the team this summer. Doug Westcott has installed a better camera and is experimenting with how it performs during services. Last Sunday he switched from the old camera to the new camera for comparison. Ideally, we would like to use both cameras effectively. The quality of spoken sound is very good. Doug and Wayne Swart are the only two who can run the sound system now. New people need to be trained to relieve them when they are not available.

Motion M/S/C to approve all committee reports.

Working Recommendations and Special Reports:

M&O Recommendation #1 (M&O#1): The Mission and Outreach Committee recommends that part of the \$1,000 donation (per January 2024 Finance Minutes) be used to make up for the \$600 PIM payment shortfall of \$600.

Motion M/S/C to approve this recommendation.

Property Committee Recommendation #1 (PCR#1): The Property Committee Recommends replacing the parsonage basement dehumidifier with a commercial grade unit, costing approximately \$1,200 - \$1,500. The committee also recommends an evaluation of the existing unit in the education wing basement for repair or replacement.

Motion M/S/C to approve this recommendation.

Consistory is invited to attend the March 19 Classis Meeting hosted by our church.

Violin Recital Discussion: It was agreed that in order to retain the integrity of coffee hour, no other access to the building to set up for activities (recitals, showers, etc.) can occur before 2:00 p.m. A \$50 use fee will be charged for the violin recitals as this is not a volunteer group. Several consistory members commented that they had attended other performances and felt this was a nice way to invite the community in to St. John's Church.

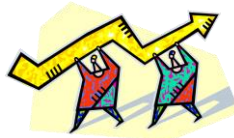
Motion M/S/C to approve adjourning the meeting after prayer.

Did You Know?



During the start of the Offertory portion of the service, the congregation is reminded of options that we have to donate to St. John's. One option listed that may sound intimidating or strange to some, is Givelify. Givelify is a free app that may be used to make donations directly to St John's. More of us are becoming more comfortable taking advantage of digital apps for making donations using apps such as GoFundMe. These apps make donating to a charity easy and have proven to be secure. Givelify is one such app that fits the needs of church communities very well because it charges low fees and allows for one time donations and electronic tithing. Givelify is user-friendly and has the bonus of keeping track of your tithes, as well as, the ability to schedule weekly, monthly or one time donations. Givelify accepts donations of any amount; even \$1! You can access Givelify via the web or via a smartphone app. For organizations like our church, there are no signup or monthly fees. Givelify takes 2.9% +\$0.30 per transaction so scheduling or tithing once a month instead of weekly, might be a better option. Givelify makes it easy to see your entire history of giving to churches and nonprofit organizations. Whether in the app or on the web, you can track your donations without searching for receipts, bank statements, or acknowledgement letters at tax time. It also can automate your recurring donations; taking away the guesswork and the time to write a check.

If you are interested, Google Givelify login. Select Givelify. You will be taken directly to the signup/signin page. In the search field, enter St. John's Reformed Red Hook NY. You will see our church listed. Select our church and you will see familiar information listed. Follow prompts from there. If you start using Givelify, your giving history for tax purposes is emailed to you by Givelify. When you receive your end of year giving statement from St John's, it will not contain your Givelify donations for that year. It will only contain your envelope or check offerings. Rest assured that the money you donated via Givelify was received by St. John's.

Good Shepherd Sunday 4/21/24
The 4TH SUNDAY OF EASTER

We are all “Good Shepherds” as we all influence someone in one way or another such as parents, our children, our own friends, and families, just to mention a few examples. Since we affect their lives, we have a shepherding role. On this day, we need to pray for our priests and all those who shepherd the Lords flock. It is a good time to look at our own lives and how we can be good shepherds to all those in our care.

In the four passages of the Bible (John 10: 27-30) Jesus teaches some very critical and important aspects of our lives as disciples. We don’t stumble into this accidentally. It is a response to hearing His voice and following Him. When Jesus gives us a simple description of discipleship as someone who hears or follows, that is our instructions to create a space in our lives. So we can then hear the voice of Jesus, always under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. As a Good Shepherd, one must stay attuned to the movement of the Holy Spirit. This can be done if we cultivate in our lives an attitude of quiet, silent prayer. We can then become sensitive to hearing inspiration of the Holy Spirit. This is how we will hear the Lord and follow Him, no matter what our state in life.

Besides being Good Shepherd Sunday, it is also Vocation Sunday. On this day we are asked to pray that the Church may be provided with the leaders needed to do its work of spreading the Gospel. God is calling every single one of us to work for the Gospel. So I’m asking all of you to think and pray about a way you can serve the Church and help to build up the Christian community as a “Good Shepherd.” As I have mentioned in other Kerk articles, many of you are already “Good Shepherds” doing his work.
