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## *Minister's Musings*

There's something rich about stories - and there is always something very familiar to them, they all have beginnings and middles and endings. The middle of stories tend to hold the conflict or a climax or something that completely upends the way we were navigating - and, that's usually what makes a story interesting. The great and sometimes ironic thing about stories that happen in our lives is that an ending is always also a beginning.

We also all have stories that we craft for ourselves, our days, our senses of time and space. A little over two years ago, the stories that we were all crafting for ourselves all had to come to a full, complete stop.

This ordinary, comforting space we inhabited was upended.

The Greek word, "Apocalypse" in the original Greek doesn't mean catastrophe, as we sometimes define it, it actually translates into "the uncovering". The crisis we went through definitely uncovered a lot of things. It uncovered immense kindness and generosity - it uncovered new skills - for me, canning and trying my hand at baking sourdough bread. I'll let you know right now, the sourdough experience was not successful for me. Moving is one of the most stressful life experiences - biologically, psychologically, physiologically, and as a community at St. John's and the world, we are all going through a "moving" of sorts from one reality to another that we can't see.

Part of our work and our calling is to stand together respectfully and honor, with kindness and honesty toward ourselves, what we have been through. In the last two years, five years and longer. Along with honoring the incredible transition, we can also be aware and notice where stress shows up for us. All the while, remembering that we're in this together and letting this be a moment of growth. Being united in the Spirit gives us strength and helps us through stressful times.

Are there ways we can actively hold one another together during transition and change?

Some questions you can ask yourself and we can ask together is: how do transitions of any kind become more than just mere stress - what is it teaching me that I want to integrate into the person I am, on the other side of this?

If we could actively accompany each other in holding that question, this may be a good start for seasons of transition and change in our lives.

SEPTEMBER**

Capital City Rescue Mission is our Mission Of the Month for September.

This faith based mission has been in operation for over 70 years in Albany, NY. The mission provides shelter, food, health care, clothing, a Chapel and a learning center for those in need.

The Mission serves more than 750 meals each day to the poor and needy residents of the community. Each night they provide shelter for 250+ men, women and children. Daily chapel services are open to anyone seeking guidance, comfort and growth in relationship with God. More than 200 local churches volunteer to provide music, prayer, and an encouraging message from the Bible. They have a free medical clinic that provides essential primary care for people who are struggling with poverty or homelessness and have no insurance. Clean usable clothing supplied by generous donors is given away free of charge. Educational resources are available to help men and women move forward in life.

The Mission also has Recovery Programs. New Faith for Women provides safety, support and Christian addiction recovery. New Life for Men offers stability, support and Christian addiction recovery. The Transitional Living Program provides a safe, supportive environment to help people move forward in a healthy lifestyle. Celebrate Recovery – A Christ-Centered Recovery Program- provides a safe, non-judgmental environment where individuals' confidentiality is kept and they are free to explore healing through a growing relationship with God and others who share common experiences.

Capital City Rescue Mission has many beautiful stories of hope and lives transformed. Feel free to check out some of their bulletins on our Mission and Outreach Board in the Fellowship Hall. And please pray about supporting this excellent Christian Mission.

This is a faith based organization that is a non-profit funded by private donations and does not accept any city, state or federal funds.

One of the most joyful ways we can worship Jesus is singing hymns of praise to him. Every Sunday we sing hymns to lift our spirit to the Lord. During the course of the year the leaders of our music ministry get approached regarding the hymns we sing and why those hymns are chosen by the music director along with the pastor.

Many of us remember hymns from our youth that we sang that brought us great joy. You may notice that we no longer sing some or some of the words have changed. You may also wonder why we purchased the red hymnals a number of years ago and retired our familiar green hymnals.

About 10 years ago, the RCA (Reformed Church of America), in partnership with the CRC (Christian Reformed Church), took a look at the various hymnals its congregations were using. Two denominations joined together to produce a volume of songs endorsed theologically by both - a hymnal to use within and beyond the two thousand worshiping communities that make up these two denominations. These hymns were curated from across the denominations by a thirteen-person editorial team along with an eighty-member advisory committee and other experts. The resulting red Hymnal, *Lift Up Your Hearts*, is the core collection that is biblical, Reformed, balanced and accessible.

The Reformed Church in America, together with the Christian Reformed Church, decided to create a hymnal that all RCA churches could use. Themes that were important to the RCA were that hymns must worship the Lord, they should reflect Biblical readings of the service, and the lyrics must reflect the inclusive beliefs of the 21st century RCA. From the editorial team, "We see great wisdom and depth of texts that have stood the test of time and the desire to hold onto the gifts of previous generations while wanting to give voice to our prayers, praises, and laments particular to this generation. In *Lift Up Your Hearts*, you'll find not only treasured hymns but also new hymns, contemporary songs, and songs from the global church." You'll find a broadstroke narrative of the Christian faith from Creation and Old Testament Witness through our Hope for Things to Come. The red hymnal helps us shape our worshiping lives together all the way from gathering in worship on a Sunday morning together to helping us in our places where we live, work and play.

Many of us love singing some patriotic hymns that represent our pride for our country. Patriotism has its place in our national celebrations such as the Fourth of July. However, the Reformed Church doesn't consider it part of the liturgy or worship of our Lord. Our worship is oriented around God and God's work in the whole world - not just the United States. We pray and join the voices of Christians across all time and space . This is why you may find a patriotic song played prior to or after a worship service.

Many of us may miss some of our favorite hymns, but there is no perfect selection of hymns that will satisfy everyone. Our hymns must invite us into worshiping the triune God using words and themes, based on the lectionary scriptures, that make all people feel included in the joyous celebration of our faith.

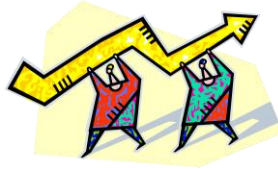

**Did You Know, the 2023 budget preparation begins in August?**

As we attended summer Sunday services in the air-conditioned fellowship hall, thoughts of next year's budget were probably not foremost in our minds. However, in late August the process begins, as each committee and staff member completes a budget worksheet indicating the anticipated expenses for next year. Property, Fellowship, Mission & Outreach and Worship Committees will review their respective expense lines from the previous year and submit projections for the next. The Personnel Committee makes staff salary recommendations based on required hours, cost of living adjustments and payroll related liabilities. Mid-Hudson Classis will offer guidance for Pastor Alisha's portion of the budget.

There are plenty of opportunities for everyone to participate. By serving on or simply attending one or more of the committee meetings, you can be part of the process. After collation in September, the tentative budget is reviewed by the Finance Committee and then by Consistory. Any interested person may attend those meetings.

A draft budget congregational mailing/emailing will arrive the first week of November. The following Sunday, after worship service, a budget Q&A meeting will be held. One week later a congregational affirmation vote completes the process. The exact dates of these meeting will be printed in future articles and in our Sunday bulletins.

Budget preparation will be challenging this year because of increased energy costs and inflation. Your interest and participation in the process is encouraged and welcomed.
